The Offertory Anthem	"Thee Will I Love"	Herbert Howells 1892-1983
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Written for an 1100 year anniversary at Peterborough Cathedral, where the Saint Peter's Choir sang in 1997.

Thee will I love, my God and King, thee will I sing, my strength and tower;

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*The Dismissal Postlude	"We All Believe In One True God"	J. S. Bach
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Music Notes: The Prelude and Postlude are *J. S. Bach's 1685-1750* interpretations of well known chorals from the Lutheran Hymnal. *Edward Bairstow (1874-1946)* was the Organist and Master of the Choir at York Minster from 1913 until his death. The text of *The Lamentation* was created by his colleague, The Very Rev. E. M. Milner-White, Dean of York Minster, drawing texts from the Biblical book of Jeremiah. *Herbert Howells (1892-1983)* was one of the great English composers of the 20th century. "Thee Will I Love" was commissioned for the Solemn Requiem on 9 November 1970, commemorating the 1100th anniversary of the massacre of the monks of the Abbey of Medchamstede – now Peterborough Cathedral – in 870 A.D. The St. Peter's Choir sang at Peterborough Cathedral in 1997, and the present Cathedral Organist – Andrew Reid – played a recital here at St. Peter's on October 26, 2004. The final hymn tune – *Michael* – was written by Howells in memory of his son.
